GIRLS BASKETBALL: WILLOWBROOK 52, LYONS TOWNSHIP 46 Freshman Calli Kenny helps rally Warriors to WSC championship

BERWYN - Calli Kenny looked like the freshest girl on the court March 13. natural given her age but surprising when considering her busy weekend.

Kenny is a freshman on a Willowbrook team full of older girls. She's also a volleyball standout. On March 12, she played three matches at a tournament in Indianapolis with her club team - and three more the morning of March 13.

She then drove back to play in two basketball games for Willowbrook.

"I don't think I was my freshest, but I knew I had to play as hard as I could," Kenny said.

She was more than good enough. Kenny scored a game-high 21 points and had 10 rebounds. Her efforts were critical in rallying the Warriors to a 52-46 win over Lyons in the championship game of the West Suburban Conference Tournament at Morton West.

Senior Taris Thornton, an Eastern Illinois recruit, added 10 points and 11 rebounds, and junior Sophie Sullivan, who, like Thornton, transferred from Montini this school year, added nine points and five assists for Willowbrook (14-2), which won its last eight games and

on March 13 avenged its only two losses.
Thornton and Sullivan each scored
20 points in Willowbrook's 56-50 win over York in the tournament semifinals.
The finals took place 30 minutes after the conclusion of that game.

Not a bad weekend and season for a Willowbrook program with not much hardware. The Warriors last won a re-gional title in 1996.

"We're going to say this was a sec-tional right there," Willowbrook coach Terry Harrell said with a laugh.

Harrell anticipated that this could be a special, albeit short season, with Thornton and Sullivan aboard and two dynamite freshmen in Kenny and Elle Bruschuk, who had a key block in the

last minute March 13. Kenny, a 5-foot-9 freshman whose mom, Andrea, was a three-sport star at Willowbrook, didn't make many spec-tacular plays or long-range shots March 13. But she always seemed to be in the right place at the right time.

Kenny scored nine points in the sec-ond quarter, helping Willowbrook rally from an early eight-point deficit to get to within 26-21 by the half. She scored nine more in the third quarter, shooting 7 for 11 from the field and 6 for 10 on free throws. Sullivan's driving layup in the

final seconds of the third quarter gave the Warriors their first lead at 34-33. "She's been great all year," Harrell said of Kenny. "I'm telling you, she doesn't look that big, she doesn't look that fast, she doesn't look like she'll outrun you, but at the end of the day she's making plays."

Plays such as ripping a defensive rebound away from a Lyons girl with 2:24 left and drawing the foul after senior Stephanie Dasbach had given the Warriors the lead for good at 44-41 on a

Hailey Markworth scored 15 points and had 11 rebounds and Lindsey Hahn added 10 points for Lyons (14-3), all 10 of her points coming in the first half.

The Lions lost their eight-point lead, but seemed to gather themselves late when Ellie Kosanovich and Markworth hit 3-pointers for a 41-37 lead with 5:46 left in the fourth quarter. But Willowbrook went to a full-court press down the stretch, and the Lions went scoreless for two minutes during a 10-0 Warriors run.

Did you know? A look at Addison's former public schools

We are all aware of the term "home-schooling" these days. Did nome-schooling these days. Did you know that the village of Addison was using the "school-home" concept in its early years?

The first public school in Addison was built on the southwast conservation.

was built on the southwest corner of Lake Street and Addison Road in 1858. This remained in use until about 1880 when a new school was constructed on Oak Street just east of Addison Road, named Oak School

The original 1858 school became the beginning structure for the house that has been added onto many times that still stands on that property to-

Oak School #1 became too small Oak School #1 occame too small and a second school was built alongside it on Oak Street in 1938, known appropriately as Oak School #2.





viated season with an overall record

Saturday's pair of games were part of the 14-team West Suburban Conference Tournament. The Warriors played their first two games of that event on March 6 at Addison Trail. Willowbrook began the tournament with a loss to Lyons Township. The Warriors won their second game on March 6, beating Addison Trail.

Saturday's game against Downers Grove South was the Warriors' second matchup against the Mustangs in less than 24 hours. The two teams met in Friday's regular-season game in Villa Park. Downers Grove South earned a narrow 66-63 win in that

The Mustangs led the Warriors 53-43 with 6:45 to play in Friday's game. Willowbrook rallied to take a 57-56 lead with 3:35 remaining. Downers Grove South regained the

"You can just see with the game, just being around each other, being together, being a team, it really does show how much they appreciate it," Tyszkiewicz said.












