Warriors roll to another decisive victory

Brown rushes for four more touchdowns; has 12 TD runs through three games

The Willowbrook football team earned its third straight convincing victory of the spring season by beating Hinsdale South 42-7 last week in Villa Park. The Warriors improved to 3-0 following their April 1 victory over the Hornets, who fell to 1-2.

Junior Josh Brown, who rushed
for eight touchdowns in the Warriors'
first two games of the season, added
four more touchdown runs against
Hinsdale South, Junior Jaylon White, Hinsdale South. Junior Jaylon White, who delivered three touchdown runs in Willowbrook's 48-13 win at Addison Trail on March 26, provided two more scoring runs in the triumph over the Hornets.

Willowbrook, which scored 41 first-half points in its victory at Addison Trail, needed more time to get rolling against Hinsdale South. Followine a scoreless first quarter, the

lowing a scoreless first quarter, the Warriors delivered two touchdowns in the second quarter to take a 14-0 halftime lead. Willowbrook added two more touchdowns in each of the next two periods.

A completion from freshman A completion from resaman quarterback A.J. Palicki to junior Haven Pryor on a fourth-and-eight play kept the Warriors' first scoring drive alive. Brown completed that drive with a 1-yard touchdown run. Junior Izabelle Manning then added the first of her six averagonit kicks. the first of her six extra-point kicks to give Willowbrook a 7-0 lead with 9:16 left in the first half.

5:26 to play in the third quarter. Less than two minutes later, the Willowbrook' defense turned in a fourth-down stop to end a Hinsdale South-drive. Brown broke a 54-yard TD run

drive. Brown broke a 54-yard TD run on the next play to push the Warriors' lead to 27-0.

Hinsdale South scored its only touchdown of the game on a short run with 3.6 seconds left in the third quarter. The Warriors responded with their fifth touchdown of the evening—a 6-yard run by White with 10:43 left in the fourth quarter.

Brown scored the Warriors' sixth and final touchdown of the game on a 47-yard run with 7:32 to play.

Through three games, Willowbrook has outscored its opponents (Leyden, Addison Trail and Hinsdale South) by a combined total of 130-20.

The Warriors will continue their The Warnors will continue their six-game spring season with this Friday's game at York. Willowbrook will play its final home game of the season on April 16, when it will face Morton. The Warnors will finish the season with an April 23 game at Province Fact.

Glowiak Hilton moves to protect consumers from scam calls

To prevent residents from being misled by phone scarns, State Sen. Suzy Glowiak Hilton (D-Western Springs) has advanced an initiative with bipar has anyanced an initiative with bipar-tisan support to outlaw scam call oper-ators from disguising their identity by having a false telephone number show up on caller ID.

"As technology advances, scam-mers use creative, deceitful tactics to trick residents into either technology."

trick residents into giving them per-sonal information," Glowiak Hilton said. "By prohibiting automated solici-tors from falsifying caller ID, I hope to protect residents from falling victim to telephone scams."

In Illinois, the Telephone Solicitations Act requires a live operator to state his or her name, the organization they are representing, and the purpose for the call. The law also prohibits a for the call. The law also prohibits a (This was received from the office of solicitor from manipulating caller ID, State Sen. Suzy Glowiak Hilton.)

commonly known as spoofing.

Current state law does not address

when the caller is not a live operator.

To protect consumers, Glowiak Hilton's initiative requires the operator of any soliciting telephone call to imme-diately state the affiliated business and the purpose of the call, and to confirm consent from the receiver.

"Deceitful business practices like spoofing are shameful," Glowiak Hil-ton said, "Call authentication is critical for protecting consumers against scammers who mask their identity and intentionally seek to defraud vulnera-



general election.

When that law expired on Jan. 1. there was no specific prohibition on their use nor was there any authorization for their use," Dietrich said in

Sangamon County Clerk Don Gray said his office is treating the single drop box outside the county building as an extension of the election office. The state's election code allows voters to return their mail-in ballots to the election authority office, which is the county election of-fice in Sangamon County.

"I can't stress enough how universally popular and successful this resource was in the November general election," Gray said in a phone

Sangamon County voters from both parties "utilized it often, and resoundingly praised it as a service," Gray said of the two drop boxes.

We don't want to confuse voters," he said, by taking away a re-source that was available to voters in November

There's risks in anything but, you know, we believe this to be an ac-

commodation of an extension of our office for people to return their bal-lots in this unique challenging envi-ronment of COVID-19, including for the consolidated (April) election,"

Larry Suffredin, an election attor-ney and Cook County Board Com-missioner, said he didn't think any le-gal challenge would be brought over the ballots returned to the drop boxes on county clerk's office premises be-cause those ballots remain under the care and control of the clerk's office.

"[County clerks] control the lockbox, they control the access to the lockbox and the law says that your mail in ballot is to be returned to the clerk. So I don't think that you have a legal issue with what's going on right w." Suffredin said.

But, given that the April election is expected to have lower turnout compared to presidential elections, the number of ballots being chal-lenged "would be very limited," Suffredin said.

"(The challenge) would not have much impact, but I don't see where they would have a claim," he said.

I am at a stage in life where I have wrapped up other volunteer opportunities and can commit fully to be an engaged and active school board member. I feel it is my time to give back to the community that supported my own children and their experience in the district.

What, in your opinion, are two or three main issues District 88 currently faces, and what steps would you take to address or resolve these issues?

The primary challenge for the district is the return of students to in-person learning and the issues that arise from the return to the classroom. This process has already started this spring. A component of the return is working with students, teachers, and administration to make sure the focus is not only on getting students back in the building, but that mental health well-being is addressed, as well as any regression that may have occurred with e-learning. Initially, the board

should review the return plan that was implemented in the spring and make sure that processes that were successful remain in place. Attention should be turned to any procedure that needs to be reworked to make sure students are successful while making sure the needs of teachers and administration are met.

If elected, what are your longterm goals as a school board member?

My goals as a school board member are to ensure the district keeps the academic standards at a high level. I would make sure the district continues working with the local institutions of higher learning to offer more instruction that will benefit students after graduation. I would also like to help grow and strengthen the community partnerships and mentor programs that have been implemented. It is also important that District 88 continues to develop programs, and use relationships, to benefit college-bound students, but also assist those students who are headed into the trades or directly into the workforce I would like to make sure the district stays focused on inclusiveness, equality and equity for all students. The Willowbrook football team suffered its first loss of the spring season on Friday, falling 25-23 to York in an exciting game in Elmhurst. The Warriors' record fell to 3-1, while York improved to 2-2.
The game was tied at 7-7, 14-14

and 17-17. York scored a go-ahead touchdown with about three minutes left in the third quarter to take a 23-17 lead. After two Willowbrook penalties during the ensuing extra-point kick, the Dukes brought their kicking unit off the field and converted a two point conversion run to increase their lead to 25-17.

Willowbrook scored a touchdown in the first minute of the fourth quarter, when junior Josh Brown deliv-ered his third score of the game. The Dukes stopped Brown short of the goal line on the two-point conver-sion attempt that would have tied the

The Warriors' final offensive drive of the night advanced the ball to near the Dukes' 10-yard line. Willow-brook missed a 29-yard field-goal at-tempt with 31 seconds to play. York then snapped the ball twice to run out

'We'll go back to the film," said Willowbrook coach Nick Hildreth after the loss in Elmhurst. "The eye in the sky never lies. We'll take a look at that. York's a realty wellcoached team with a bunch of really good football players. But we had opportunities and didn't capitalize on

The Warriors scored on the opening drive of the game. Brown com-pleted the drive with a 3-yard touch-
