# Warriors claim a second-place finish at WSGC Meet; Addison Trail third

Braden sprints to three individual victories; she also contributes to a relay win

Willowbrook's girls track and field team finished second in the overall standings of last week's West Suburban Gold Conference Meet. The Warriors compiled a 161-point total in the seven-team event, which took place on May 26 at Morton High School's west campus. Downers Grove South won the meet's team championship with its total of 189 points.

Addison Trail placed third with

its total of 91 team points. Senior Daylee Braden of Willow-

brook delivered three first-place fin-ishes and contributed to a winning relay team. Braden won the 100-meter dash in 12.72 seconds. She ran to a victory in the 200-meter run, which she completed in 25.92 seconds. Braden turned in another winning performance in the 400-meter run, which she completed in a first-place time of 59.25 seconds.

Braden joined sophomores Bri-anna Alandy, Sarah Ball and Molly Morris on the Warriors' first-place quartet in the 4 x 100-meter relay. The foursome completed the race in 51.04 seconds.

Alandy, Ball and Morris teamed with freshman Bailey Heselton on Willowbrook's victorious run in the 4 x 200-meter relay. The Warriors won that race in 1:50.61.

Ball provided an individual vic-tory for Willowbrook with her firstplace run in the 300-meter hurdles (51.15). Alandy finished second to Braden in the 100-meter dash (12.77), Alandy ran to a third-place tie in the 200-meter run, which she finished in 27.37 seconds.

The team of junior Lily Weder, sophomore Abby Kusmierz, freshman Elle Bruschuk and sophomore Amelia Barrington earned a second-place finish in the 4 x 400-meter relay (4:19.38).

Weder contributed a second-place individual effort in the 400-meter run, which she finished in 1:00.82. Willowbrook's foursome

Kusmierz, junior Madeline Bar-rington, sophomore Cailey Dotson and sophomore Alyssa McKenna ran to a third-place finish in the 4 x 800-meter relay (11:35.87). Bruschuk placed fourth in the


The Blazers' foursome of Scarabaggio, Greaves, junior Ange-lina Camachi and senior Jade Campos delivered a third-place finish



# Villa Park resident dies after officer-involved shooting

Officer fired four shots after subject reportedly refused to drop weapon; subject who died apparently made the initial 9-1-1 call to report a person with a gun

A Villa Park resident died after begin shot by a Villa Park police officer during an early

orning incident last week.
According to information provided by the Villa Park Police Department, officers responded to the 200 block of East Kenilworth Avenue, near Summit Avenue, at approximately 2:06 a.m. on Monday, May 24.

Upon arrival, officers encountered a person with a gun. That encounter led to an officer-

involved shooting.

The resident who made the 9-1-1 call to report a subject with a gun was reportedly the rson who was shot by an officer.

According to the police department, officers

who arrived in the area encountered a person who walked directly toward them while apparently armed with a handgun. Officers reportedly told the person several times to drop

the weapon.

"An officer, in fear for his life, shot the person four times when they refused to drop the gun," stated a releas Police Department. stated a release issued by the Villa Park

Police immediately began life-saving measures after the shooting. Haven A. Bailey, 25, who was a resident of the 200 block of East Kenilworth Avenue, was transported to Advocate Good Samaritan Hospital in Downers Grove. Bailey later died at the hospital.

According to the police department, a black

pellet gun made to look like a Sig Sauer 1911 pistol was recovered from the scene of the shooting. The police department also stated that the preliminary investigation revealed Bailey made the initial 9-1-1 call to report that there was a person with a gun in the street. The DuPage County Metropolitan

Emergency Response and Investigation Team (MERIT) responded to the scene of the shooting less than two hours after the incident. According to the Villa Park Police Department, the investigation of the shooting is ongoing.

Villa Park Police Chief Michael Rivas stated late last week that the department would have no additional comments about the incident at this stage of the investigation.

"The boundaries for Illinois Supreme Court districts have not been updated for several decades, it's time we make changes in been updated for several decades, it's time we make changes in recognition of the population changes and demographic shifts that have taken place since the 1960s," said Sen. Omar Aquino, chair of the Senate Redistricting Committee. "Illinois is a very different state than it was sixty years ago, and the voters of Il-linois deserve to elect members to our state's highest court that

reflect their values."
This new map will not impact the tenure of the current Appellate and Supreme Court justices.
All justices running for retention will have the right to do


All justices running for retention will have the right to do so in their current districts. Further, this map avoids disruption to the Judicial Branch by ensuring that the Appellate Courts can remain where they currently reside and avoid changing the compositions or boundaries of the judicial circuits.

Consistent with the proposed legislative maps, this proposed map was drafted using population information from the American Community Survey's (ACS) 5-year estimate for 2019. The ACS estimate varies by just 0.3 percent from the state's official population count released by the U.S. Census Bureau in April.

# Did You Know? Big parties not new to Addison

We are all looking forward to getting out and getting together with family, friends and neighbors as soon as possible. As of this writing. The village of Addison is planning to restart the Rock-'N-Wheels festivities on Thursday, July 1 on the Vil-lage Green. This location has hosted many large gatherings in past years. In 1873, the Evangelical Luther-

an Orphanage Asylum Association of Northern Illinois was established in Addison and purchased 38 acres of land west of the existing Lutheran Teachers Seminary continuing all the way to Mill Road between Lake Street and Army Trail Road. This area is where the Lutherbrook group of buildings is today.

In 1877, an all-day outdoor festival add to Addison's history.

to allow visitors from the Chicago area to learn about the home and the benefits it was providing. This first festival drew an attendance of more than 5,000 people. The travelers from Chicago would take a train to Elmhurst, then a horse-and-buggy carriage ride to Addison. In 1890, the Illinois Central Railroad added a spur line that connected from North Ave-nue to Lake Street, which allowed more visitors to attend.

In 1947, festival attendance was

anticipated to exceed 10,000 people. The home and school enrollment at the time was 140 children, and the population of Addison was about 800 residents.

The orphanage land is no longer in use and awaits the next chapter it will
