State's attorney finds Villa Park officer justified in deadly shooting

Officer fired four shots after responding to subject's 9-1-1 call in May; subject who placed call had reportedly discussed 'suicide by cop'

DuPage County State's Attornev Robert Berlin announced last week that a Villa Park Police officer was justified in shooting a subject during an incident earlier this year

The officer, Sgt. Jose Pagan, reportedly shot Haven Bailey, 25, after responding to a 9-1-1 call in the 200 block of East Kenilworth Avenue shortly after 2 a.m. on May 24. Bailey, who reportedly made the 9-1-1 call to report "somebody walking around with a gun," was transported to Advocate Good Samaritan Hospital and pronounced dead at 4:29 a.m.

"Every case involving the use of deadly force by a police officer must be carefully and thoroughly investigated," said Berlin in a state-ment his office issued last week.

"Such scrutiny is required to en-sure the protection of the civil rights of those involved and to maintain the public's confidence in law en-

tails about Bailey's 9-1-1 call and subsequent comments to a Du-Comm operator. Multiple Villa Park police units, including Sgt. Pagan, responded to the call.

After a thorough and extensive investigation surrounding the shooting of Haven Bailey by a Villa Park police officer, it is my determi-nation that the officer, Sergeant Jose Pagan, who discharged his weapon four times, striking Haven Bailey four times, once in the right chest and three times in the abdomen, was legally justified in his actions and that no criminal charges will be filed against Sergeant Pagan," stat-ed Berlin. The investigation of the incident included reviews of Bailey's 9-1-1 call, cellular phone data, squad car videos, photographs, witness accounts and physical evi-

reportedly described the gun as a pistol. Bailey then left the conver-sation but did not hang up. Pagan and another officer were

reportedly the first officers to arrive

"As the other officer started to walk toward the house, he heard what he believed was a fence or door swing open near the front of the residence and observed a person, later determined to be Haven Bailey, standing to the east side of the front of the residence," noted last week's statement from Berlin. "Both Sergeant Pagan and the other officer observed a black handgun, later determined to be a CO2 pellater determined to be a CO2 pel-let-style gun, in Bailey's right hand. Both Sergeant Pagan and the other officer gave loud and clear com-mands to Bailey to put the gun down including "typon the sup." ""Olease including "drop the gun," "please put the gun down, please put the gun down, "and "drop the gun please." Despite their commands, Bailey did not drop the gun."

According to Berlin's statement,

Pagan attempted to de-escalate the situation, but Bailey approached Pagan with gun in hand. Pagan then fired his gun four times, While processing the scene, au-

while processing the scene, au-thorities recovered a black CO2 pellet-style gun with "Sig Sauer 1911" written on it. According to Berlin's statement, a DNA sample taken from the CO2 pellet-style gun matched Bailey's DNA profile

It is important to remember that police officers are often forced to make split-second decisions about the appropriate amount of force grieve the loss of a loved one

walking around with a gun. Bailey necessary to bring a tense, uncertain and rapidly evolving situation under control," noted Berlin, whose statement referred to an investigation of the shooting conducted by the DuPage Metropolitan Emergency Response and Investigation Team (MERIT).

Berlin's statement included quotes from Pagan, who said that Bailey walked straight toward him while holding the gun.

"If I had not fired my weapon at that point, I thought I was going to get shot," Pagan stated.

The investigation also revealed text messages Bailey sent three minutes before the 9-1-1 call. One message read, in part, "I'm sorry in advance."

The investigation of the shoot-ing indicated that about one month before the incident, Bailey had conversations with a trusted family member. During that conversation. Bailey reportedly talked about "suicide by cop.

"It is indeed heartbreaking when a loved one meets an untimely death," said Berlin at the end of his statement. "The sad truth in the tragic death of Haven Bailey however, is that Haven saw suicide as the only way to find true peace. On behalf of the DuPage County State's Attorney's Office, I offer our sincerest sympathies to the family and friends of Haven Bailey as they

Cullerton supports bill to help loved ones stay connected

State Sen. Tom Cullerton (D- Villa Park) spearheaded a measure that was signed on Monday, Aug. 16, to help connect residents of long-term care facilities to loved ones during disasters like the COVID-19 pan-

'We've learned from this pandemic how social isolation can have such a negative effect on mental health, especially for older adults in our state,"
Cullerton said. "It's so important that if anything like this pandemic happens again, long-term care facilities have a plan of action to make sure their residents have the opportunity to call their loved ones frequently.

According to a report from the National Academies of Sciences, En-gineering, and Medicine, more than one-third of adults aged 45 and older

report feeling lonely, and nearly one-fourth of adults aged 65 and older are considered to be socially isolat-ed. COVID-19 has only exacerbated these statistics.

The measure would require long-

term care facilities to make every reasonable effort to facilitate at least one phone or video call between a resident and a family member each day during a disaster declared by the governor. It also requires hospitals to develop a policy to encourage patients to engage with family members during a public health emergency.
