


Willowbrook's volleyball team ends season with a loss to Mother McAuley in Friday's IHSA Class 4A super-sectional match in Chicago. Mother McAuley, which won the contest on its home court, advanced to this week's state semifinals in Normal. The Warriors completed their season with a record of 37-2. Prior to this season, the Willowbrook program had never won a regional champlonship. This season's team won a regional title, as well as a sectional title. After posting two post-season wins on its own court to win a regional plaque, Willowbrook advanced to the Bartlett Sectional. The Warriors beat Downers Grove North in three games in a Nov. 1 sectional semifinal. Two days later, Willowbrook defeated Wheaton Warrenville South in the sectional final. Willowbrook senior Ellie Hassler of Villa Park will compete in the upcoming IHSA. girls state swimming and diving meet at FMC Natatorium in Westmont, Hassler qualified for the state meet with her performances at Saturday's Downers Grove South Sectional. Hassler, who is a member of

the Willowbrook/Addison Trail co-op team, competed in the AWD (athletes with disabilities) division at the sectional. She earned state-meet berths in three individual events—the 50-yard freestyle, the 100-yard freestyle and the 100-yard breaststroke.
Hassler finished the

sectional's 50-yard freestyle in 40.19 seconds. She posted a finishing time of 1 minute, 33.06 seconds in the 100-yard freestyle at the sectional. She completed Saturday's 100-yard breaststroke race in 2 minutes, 17.66 seconds.

Why Herrera was selected: Herrera had two goals and an assist in a 4-0 win over Fremd in the Class 3A state championship game as the Dukes won their first state title. Herrera also had a goal and an assist in a 3-2 win over Lockport in the state semifinal. Herrera was voted by readers as the Suburban Life Athlete of the Week.

Here is Herrera's interview with Sports Editor Joshua Welge.

Welge: What does it mean to win a state title?

Herrera: It's an honor to play with this group of guys. They've taught me a lot. They taught me to play hard even when we're down. It's an honor to be a part of the first team in school history to be soccer state champions. It's amazing.

Welge: What was the mindset going in against a very good Fremd

Herrera: We had a bunch of players on our team that knew a bunch of players on their team. We had an idea of what we had to do. We had to guard up, stay on our man, and that's what we did. We came out on top and it felt great.

Welge: How did your goals happen?

Herrera: The first goal, it was 30 seconds in, I really didn't celebrate that much. We knew once we had that first goal we needed to get the second one. I was happy that Sam [Musial] was able to

slap that one in. The third goal, Sam made an amazing run. Last goal, I had to finish it off, a chip over the goalkeeper. That made us state champs.

Welge: At what point this season did you believe this team was capable of winning a state title?

Herrera: Before the summer, and summer league. I saw the group of guys that came out for tryouts. Our goal was to make it to state and the state finals. It feels amazing that we set this goal, and we accomplished it. It was a hard challenge but we overcame and we are state champs.

Welge: How would you describe yourself as a player? You seem to be a big-time goal scorer [24 goals

Herrera: I don't really want to give myself all the credit. The people that gave me the passes, those are the people that deserve the credit. They made sure I had a clear opportunity and I had to make sure I put it in the back of the net. We did amazing and I love those guys.

Willowbrook's historic season comes to a close

CHICAGO - The Willowbrook volleyball team has spent the entire year turning heads. Winning all but one of its first 38 matches and securing the first sectional championship in school history, it seemed there was nothing the group couldn't achieve.

However, taking on top-ranked Mother McAuley proved to be a task too tall for the Warriors. Though it hung neck and neck with the vaunted Mighty Macs, Willowbrook ultimately lost 25-18, 25-21 in the Class 4A Mother McAuley Supersectional on Nov. 5.

Mother McAuley is a 15-time state champion.

"I'm so proud of this team for just a historic run and what we've done for Willowbrook High School," Warriors coach Irene Mason said. "Our goal coming into this was to get conference and regional champions again this

year. We far surpassed the goals that we set for ourselves in the beginning to the point where we had to keep making new goals every time because we were achieving them all."

Willowbrook proved it was going to be a tough out to start the night, battling back and forth with the Mighty Macs and forcing an 8-8 tie midway through the first set. But three kills from sophomore Ellie White quickly helped push Mother McAuley to a 13-9 advantage. White added another kill after a

Warriors timeout, and the Mighty Macs stretched their lead to as much as eight points.

Kills from sophomore Calli Kenny and senior Kyla Ostrowski brought Willowbrook back to within five, but Mother McAuley senior Peyton Brokemond added two late spikes to secure a 25-18 win.

Montini moves on to state after 33rd straight win

ELMHURST - The quiet bus ride home after a loss to Glenbard West on Aug. 28 was something Montini didn't want to experience again.

Thirty-three straight wins later, the

Lady Broncos still haven't. On Nov. 5, Montini added a Class 2A IC Catholic Supersectional champion-ship to its amazing run, defeating Rock

Falls 25-17, 25-18 in Elmhurst. Improving to 38-1 in the fall, the Lady Broncos advanced to the state semifinals at Redbird Arena where they will square off against Breese Mater Dei on Friday, Nov. 12. The two teams met Oct. 23 with Montini winning in two sets.
"When we lost that first match, and

now only match, of the season, that lit a fire under us," senior Paige Pickering said. "We hated that feeling. We hated that bus ride home. We didn't want to feel that again, so we've worked our butts off in practice. We haven't lost since so I guess it's working. "This feels so awesome. I don't have

any other word but awesome. Every time I see that supersectional plaque, my breath is taken away."

The Lady Broncos led from start to finish in the opener after jumping out to a 7-3 lead. Pickering had four kills while Maddie Kasallis and Jordan

While Maddle Rasallis and obtain Heatherly had five apiece. "This is so special," said Kasallis, whose kill ended the first set. "I'm just so unbelievably proud of my team. We've worked so hard. And we've held each other accountable, from showing up to practice to getting all our reps in. We realized we all wanted the same thing and we had to work together if we wanted to reach our goals." Montini charged out to a 9-2 advan-

tage in the second set but the Lady Rockers fought back. Rock Falls tied the score at 15-all and later 17 apiece before the Lady Broncos scored eight of the final nine points. An ace by Pickering sent the team to its second state semifinals in program history.

"We've wanted this since freshman year," said senior libero Reegan Boyer, who along with Kasallis and Pickering have been on the varsity for four years. "We've been working for it and we worked even harder for it this year. But our work isn't done. We have two more matches. "We are one big friend group and

that is rare to have on a team. And that shows when we are out on the court. We play together, and if we can continue to work together like we have been working together, you see the results."

Kasallis finished with nine kills, Pickering had eight kills and two aces

and Heatherly totaled six kills.

"This is unbelievable," second-year Montini coach Trish Samolinski said. They've given so much time in the gym since I came in last year with the goal to get down to state. This is 100% a team effort from the bench to the fans to the school.

"Rock Falls is tough. They are fan-tastic and well-coached. We knew it would be a grind."

Rock Falls, with only five seniors on its roster, had entered with 37 wins and only one defeat, with 34 of those victories in two sets. Mallory Pinske led the team with seven kills and Claire Bickett and Maya Sands had six

Sands will play at UNLV next year and Pinske will continue her career at the University of Pittsburgh-John-

"We had that little spurt in the second game," Rock Falls coach Sheila Pillars said. "That's how we mainly played all season. We had been laser focused for the past two weeks so I don't really know what happened. But Montini is an excellent team. They took us out of some things

"We had a great group of senior leaders. A lot of them are going on to play in college and they really laid the groundwork for the underclassmen. Those are big shoes to fill. They are great people on and off the court."

"The level of intensity both teams played with tonight was impressive," Mason said. "We knew they were a great team coming into this, and we knew the level that we were going to have to be at. I think both teams played incredible

The Warriors fell behind early in the second set, calling a timeout after Mother McAuley grabbed a 9-3 lead. With nerves settled, Willowbrook clawed its way back into the contest, trimming the defi-cit to 15-14 thanks to kills from Hannah Kenny. The freshman led the team with six kills on the night, proudly letting everyone know the stage wasn't too big

for her.

"I knew I really had to come through
for our team," Kenny said. "We needed a
fire, and somebody needed to step up. All the cheering and that energy, it really just makes me want to play better.'

The efforts didn't go unnoticed from

"She's a one-of-a-kind type of kid," Mason said. "Early on during one play-off game, she did say the nerves got to her a little bit. We worked on some stuff with that in practice and she hasn't

turned around since."

Kenny added another kill down the stretch, forcing Mother McAuley to cling to a 21-20 edge. But the Mighty Macs responded with a 4-1 run, blocking a final Willowbrook kill attempt and bringing

its triumphant season to a close

Though they fell short of the state semifinals, the Warriors know a successful year will only increase expectations. It's a challenge they're more than ready for, with Kenny already eyeing a rematch just minutes after the game's conclusion.

"I'm ready to come back next year, beat Mother McAuley and go to state," Kenny said. "This is just the beginning for us. We're all ready for bigger things

Joe Tumilty adds chapter to family legacy, leads Willowbrook's stirring comeback win over Moline

VILLA PARK - Moline experienced a case of deja vu Nov. 5.

Two years ago, Willowbrook pounded the Maroons in a Class 7A first-round playoff game. Sam Tumilty threw four touchdowns to spark the Warriors to the playoff win.

In a return matchup of the two teams, it was Joe Tumilty's turn to add

teams, it was de ruminy a tank to the Maroons' woes.

A junior wide receiver and defensive back, Joe Tumilty sparked a stunning comeback in the final seven-plus minutes, intercepting a pass and tossing the winning touchdown to lead the 21st-seeded Warriors to a 30-26 upset victory over fifth-seeded Moline in a Class 7A second-round playoff game in Villa Park.

Not only did the younger Tumilty add another chapter to his family's growing gridiron legacy, but his strong two-way performance extended the Warriors' streak to five straight quarterfinal appearances.
The Warriors (8-3) advanced to play

No. 4 seed Wheaton North this v

The 5-foot-9, 165-pound Tumilty had a 40-yard touchdown reception to open the scoring and added a 45-yard interception return with just over seven minutes left in regulation to set up his 56-yard pass off a jet sweep to Nick Mabutas with 6:14 left in the fourth

Despite Tumilty's memorable out-ing, his best moves came during the postgame, deflecting question after question about his place in the Tumilty football household, which also includes Scott Tumilty.

"Two years ago, I was on the side-lines [against Moline], so it was fun to watch my brother; so It was luft to watch my brother; s play and learn from them because they are my role models," Joe Tumilty said. "I just tried to play hard for my teammates, and it was fun to come together as a team. ... It was a firm game

"I just play for my teammates and as hard as I can to put points on [the board] for my team and make tackles. My older

brothers were very good out here."

The momentum of the game shifted three times, with Tumilty's 40-yard touchdown grab 30 seconds into the game helping the Warriors build a 10-0 lead. The Maroons answered by outsooring the Warriors 26-7 the rest of the half, capped by a Hail Mary TD on the final play to seize a 26-17 lead at halftime.

"[Moline] has a bunch of weapons all ond-half turnovers. over the place, and they do a really good job with the single wing and their quarterback throws the ball well and makes good decisions," Willowbrook coach Nick Hildreth said. "We talked about some adjustments and things we wanted to do differently. We knew we had to get stops and string things together."

The Warriors benefited from some questionable play calling by the Maroons in the fourth quarter to mount their comeback after a scoreless third quarter, including forcing three sec-

After Mabutas, who had five recep-tions for 138 yards and two touchdowns, caught a 14-yard TD to lower the deficit to 26-24 early in the fourth, Tumilty intercepted a pass and returned it 45 yards with 7:14 left. One minute later, Tumilty shocked Moline's defense, tossing a 56-yard TD to Mabutas for the winning touchdown. Vince Vassolo sealed the win with an interception at the 1:18

"Each [Tumilty] is a different kid and brings a different skill set," Hildreth

said. "We talked about that before the game. Our mantra is 'maintain the culture' and what that means about the guys that come before us and after."

Willowbrook senior running back Jaylon White, who rushed for 102 yards

and a touchdown, praised the team's heart – and Tumilty – for the comeback. "This'is amazing," White said. "We were down at halftime, but we knew we could come back and keep fighting. It's amazing playing with a Tumilty. They're almost all the same. Just amazing players."

Cullerton-supported legislation pushes green transportation measures

State Sen. Tom Cullerton (D- Villa Park) joined his colleagues in supporting a piece of legislation to put Illinois in the forefront of green transportation during the recent fall

The Reimagining Electric Vehi-cles in Illinois Act will preserve and create jobs in Illinois and incentive

manufactures to move to the state.
"When the General Assembly
passed the Clean and Equitable Jobs
Act this past spring, we laid the groundwork for putting Illinois on the map as a hub for green innova-tion," Cullerton said. "Bringing elec-tric vehicle manufacturers here will further push our state toward prog-

ress."

Before passing this legislation, Illinois was already home to two major electric vehicle manufacturers: Rivian, which is located in Normal and produces electric SUVs and trucks, and Lion Electric Company, a Canadian-based company that produces medium and heavy-duty urban vehicles that opened a new facility in Joliet this year.

The new measure will provide a tax credit for manufacturers of electric vehicles, parts and power sup-

Businesses in underserved areas would be eligible for a larger benefit. Additionally, training cost tax credits can increase if new employees are recent college grads, certificate holders or credential recipients from a col-

lege in Illinois.

Cullerton also advocated for the inclusion of electric motorcycles un-der the definition of electric vehicles in the legislation.

"Already, the plant that manufac-tures Jeep Cherokees is looking to expand production to include elec-tric vehicles," Cullerton said. "These manufacturing facilities will bring steady, good-paying jobs to Illinois

as we transition into a clean energy economy."

The state is already home to over

30,000 workers in the auto production industry and over 5,000 workers in the electric transportation industry, with these numbers expected to double in the next two years.

House Bill 1769 passed both chambers and is awaiting final approval from the governor.

Warriors rally to beat Moline and move on to quarterfinals

Willowbrook's defense shuts out Maroons in the second half

The Willowbrook football team advanced to the IHSA Class 7A quarterfi-nals after rallying to beat Moline 30-26 in Friday's second-round playoff game

The Warriors, who moved their overall season record to 8-3 with their win over Moline (9-2), will play another home playoff game this week. They will host Wheaton North (10-1) this

Priday. The contest will begin at 7 p.m.
Willowbrook's football program
has now made it to at least the quarterfinal round in each of the last five IHSA post-seasons. The Warriors advanced to the quarterfinals in 2016 (in the 7A level), 2017 (6A) and 2018 (7A). Willowbrook won three playoff games in 2019 to earn a berth in the semifinal round of the Class 7A play-offs. The 2020 season was postponed because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The state's IHSA football teams played shortened six-game season, with no

Moline led the Warriors 26-17 at halftime. The Maroons scored on the final play of the first half, when they completed a 30-yard pass into the end zone. Moline missed the extra-point

After a scoreless third quarter, Willowbrook cut into Moline's lead early in the fourth quarter. Sophomore quar-terback A.J. Willowbrook completed its season with an overall record of 37-2. The Warriors, who won the program's first regional title on Oct. 28, reached another new height by adding a sec-

tional championship on Nov. 3.

Two days after beating Downers




