DuPage Foundation mourns passing of co-founder Mary Eleanor Wall

Mary Eleanor Wall, a co-founder of DuPage Foundation, passed away recently, leaving behind a celebrated legacy and lifelong com-mitment to com-munity. She was



munity. She was Mary Eleanor 92 years old. Wall As a visionary in community and civic affairs, Mary Eleanor was an influential voice who helped bring DuPage Foundation to life in 1986 with the late Jerry Bradshaw and Brooks McCormick. She recognized the need for a local charitable organization that would raise the quality of life for the residents of DuPage County. Today, her vision remains County. Today, her vision remains as the Foundation surpassed \$65 million in cumulative grants and op-

million in cumulative grants and operates under the same guiding principles created more than 35 years ago.

Mary Eleanor's leadership within the community started long before the Foundation's inception.

An Elmhurst resident since 1959, she became actively involved in the community as she raised three sons. She was a member of the Elmhurst branch of the American Association of University Wongen and served as President from 1965 to 1967. She served as Illinois AAUW state presi-

served as Illinois AAUW state president from 1979 to 1981.

In 1971, Mary Eleanor founded the DuPage County Democratic Women's Caucus and, in 1974, became one of the first Democratic women to be elected to the DuPage County Board. She also served as a Reseat Description.

County Board. She also served as a Forest Preserve Commissioner and DuPage County Regional Planning Commissioner in the late 70s.

In 1975, Mary Eleanor helped form the DuPage Council. Later, she served as both a board member and the first executive director of Senior Home Sharing, Inc. She received two presidential appointments from President Jimmy Carter. Her first appointment in 1977 was to the nine-member presidential

commission to make recommendations to the President for a new direc-tor of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The second appointment was to the Advisory Commission on In-tergovernmental Relations, on which

she served from 1980 to 1982. In 1985, Brooks McCormick became a member of the DuPage Coun-ty Planning Commission. At the time, he was also chairman of the executive committee for The Chicago Community Trust. Working together, Community Irus. Working together, Mary Eleanor and Brooks saw the extraordinary population growth in DuPage and believed in the power of establishing a local philanthropic re-source to meet the County's growing needs. Jerry Bradshaw, a prominent Wheaton banker, was asked to join the effort and The DuPage Commu-nity Foundation was established.

Six other community leaders were Six other community leaders were recruited for their special areas of expertise to guide the Foundation's structure and scope of grantmaking. The first advisory committee included: Jerry C. Bradshaw, Elizabeth D. Eben, Jody E. Ellyne, John R. Hor-ton, Brooks McCormick, Carleton Nadelhoffer, Hartman E. Stime, Charlie A. Thurston, and Mary Elea-

Once the Foundation began making grants and became a permanent fixture and helping hand of the community, the momentum for community, the momentum for community. nity giving drew others to the cause. Mary Eleanor served as the Founda-tion's first Board Chair from 1986 to 1991 and was designated a Trustee Emerita upon her retirement from the Board. She also served on several Foundation committees, including Grant Committee from 1988-2006; the Bylaws Committee from 1988-2017; and the McCormick Match Committee from 2000-2004.

"Mary Eleanor Wall was a driving force behind DuPage Foundation and one of the most celebrated leaders of our 35-year history," said DuPage Foundation President and CEO Dave McGowan. "Without Mary Eleanor, there is no DuPage Foundation. She

was a special person with a unique vision and strong ambition to make DuPage County a better place. We were fortunate to know her and it's been our honor to carry out her vi-sion of fostering philanthropy and building community partnerships." Mary Eleanor received countless

awards for her dedication to helping the community. In 2000, she was named Humanitarian of the Year by the West Suburban Philanthropic Network and received the Community Service Professional Award from Metropolitan Family Services DuPage. A year later, she was honored as she was profiled in a book, The First Ladies of Elmhurst: Prominent Women of the Twentieth Century. The book was researched by the late Ruth Strand and written by Eugenie

A 'superhero' discovering her powers: Lenee Beaumont led Benet to 30 wins, 4th at state

Benet coach Joe Kilbride makes a unique comparison when describing his star junior guard Lenee Beaumont, and it's not a basketball player.

It does reflect Beaumont's vast abilities and potential.

I think she is sort of like in Spider-Man when he was just discovering his powers," Kilbride said. "I feel like Lenee is kind of a superhero who is just discovering her powers and hasn't quite figured out ways to use them. But she has such an array of abilities. When she learns to fully use them,

she'll be tremendous.'

Beaumont is a unicorn with a unique skill set for a guard, a facilitator and skilled passer with length at 6-foot. She is also like the modern-day pro point guard who can score. Beaumont put Benet on her back offensively in the first half of its supersectional win over Young. Legend has it that in Benet drills to see how many 3-pointers they can make in a minute, Beaumont routinely swishes 20 or so.

"It's hard to get off 25 shots in a minute, let alone make them," Kilbride said. "I can believe that every team we play is scheming 'How are we going to guard this kid?'"

That dilemma was not uncommon.

College coaches woke up to Beaumont last spring and summer in a big way. Northwestern and Wisconsin offered her in June 2021. Illinois, Iowa, Michigan and Tennessee joined the wave of offers in July that now are close to 35. DePaul coach Doug Bruno had come to a couple of Beaumont's games after eighth grade and offered her a scholarship before her freshman year.
"I had no question that it would hap-

pen. Same thing with [Benet senior and Navy recruit] Morgan [Demos]," Kil-bride said. "Coaches hadn't seen her, but I knew she'd be fine. Morgan blew up, too, but she was like a cherry bomb. Lenee was a grenade, the size of the explosion."

Beaumont said she hopes to make a college decision before AAU season in July. In the meantime, she continues to work on developing a better mindset, what Kilbride calls a "dog mentality" in taking charge of her team. His only com-plaint is at times she's too unselfish, and Beaumont knows that. Last summer when Kilbride started working with this group he would stop and make the girls run if Beaumont passed up an open shot. "The way he explains it, if we need a

bucket. I have to be the one to step up. to not fear and stray away from the moment," Beaumont said. "When it's time to take over, I need to step up.'
